

## What is the job outlook and salary range?

Criminal Justice jobs are expected to grow faster than average for all occupations through 2012. A more security-conscious society and concern about drug related crimes will contribute to the increasing demand for police services as well as trained correctional officers and other public safety professionals. Starting salaries in the region for entry-level jobs in the criminal justice field range from \$24,000- \$34,000 a year. The regional demand for Corrections and Law Enforcement academy graduates fluctuates, but is generally strong. Both OWC Basic Recruit Academy programs boast excellent job placement rates for graduates.

## When are the classes taught? Can I work while enrolled?

The general coursework for the A.A.S. degree in Criminal Justice is offered in both day and evening format at all six OWC locations. Coursework for the Basic Recruit Academies in Law Enforcement and Corrections are held in both day and evening formats. Specialized training in firearms and defense tactics is held at the Niceville campus. Academy training includes training in Florida criminal law, firearms, First Aid, defensive tactics, and emergency vehicle operations (law enforcement academy only).

## What is the cost of the program?

OWC fees are the lowest in Florida of any state college or university. A special in-state fee is available at OWC for Alabama residents. Vocational credit courses carry lower fees. Expenses such as textbooks and materials are additional. See www.owc.edu for current fees.

## Is Financial Aid available?

The mission of OWC is to serve everyone who can benefit from a college education. OWC offers an extensive financial aid program. More than \$12 million in financial assistance is awarded to OWC students annually through federal, state, and local grants, college work-study, loans and scholarships. ## General Information

Okaloosa-Walton College offers an Associate of Applied Science (A.A.S.) degree in Criminal Justice Technology and vocational credit certificate programs in Corrections and Law Enforcement. Students may complete a vocational certificate while working on the A.A.S. degree requirements. The A.A.S. and certificate programs provide students with the educational background necessary for immediate entry into the job market.

The OWC Law Enforcement and Corrections Basic Recruit Academy programs require a separate application and entry requirements. The academy programs prepare students for state certification that qualifies graduates for county, city or state jobs throughout Florida. Certification also transfers to other states and training qualifies for future credit toward dual certification. OWC is a Florida Department of Law Enforcement certified program and the region's designated Criminal Justice Training Center.

Students who intend to transfer to a four-year institution to earn a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice or a related field should earn an Associate of Arts (A.A.) degree and speak to an OWC advisor to plan an appropriate program of study.


### Accreditation

## What is Criminal Justice?

The safety, order, and freedom of society depends on our criminal justice professionals. These men and women are law enforcement officers, security officers, detectives, investigators, deputy sheriffs, correctional officers, and public safety administrators. Their job duties include investigating complaints, handling traffic emergencies, arresting violators, overseeing people in jails and prisons, researching information on suspected criminals, and issuing citations.

Criminal Justice Technology graduates are qualified for positions with police departments, sheriff's offices, prisons, courts, probation agencies, parole agencies, and private industries. OWC Basic Recruit Academy graduates in Law Enforcement and Corrections are qualified to take the state certification test to qualify for county, city or state jobs throughout Florida. **Over for more info**>

# **Criminal Justice**

To begin the Criminal Justice Technology degree or Basic Recruit Academy programs in Corrections or Law Enforcement: Criminal Justice

# A.A.S degree program:

- Have a high school diploma or GED high school equivalent diploma. If you have not yet completed a diploma you may apply for admission, but must complete a diploma before you are admitted as a degree-seeking student.
- Submit OWC admission and residency forms to OWC.
- Request official transcripts from high school, GED or any post-secondary institution attended.
- Meet with an advisor to plan a program of study before enrolling in classes.

## Law Enforcement or Corrections Academy Requirements:

- ✤ Be at least 19 years old.
- ♦ Be a U.S. citizen.
- Be a high school graduate or have a GED/high school equivalent diploma.
- ♦ Be of good moral character.
- Take TABE test and FBAT test (Testing available through OWC) prior to completing academy application.
- Pass a physical exam by a licensed physician.
- Attend a Public Safety orientation.
