To whom it may concern-

In May 2005, I took a trip to Guanaja, Honduras (one of the Honduran Bay Islands). Bill and Martha Pullum (friends for over 25 years) invited my wife Jean and I (and another couple who are also close, personal friends) to visit Guanaja and to see the Cay where they were building an Island home. I was also invited so I could see the plight of the residents of Guanaja related to devastation they received from Hurricane Mitch in 1998. Specifically, I was invited because of my then recent experiences as a County Commissioner in disaster recovery related to Hurricane Ivan, and from the near destruction of my family's home from a lightning strike in 2000.

Bill and Martha had become acquainted with Guanaja during a construction mission trip conducted by the Gulf Breeze United Methodist Church. The Gulf Breeze Rotary Club and the City of Gulf Breeze have also completed several humanitarian trips to Guanaja since 1999. As the web site for Clark's Cay explains, Bill and Martha felt strongly enough about the area that they purchased the small island and began the process of rebuilding the Cay. Through the introduction of basic infrastructure that we take for granted (electricity and running water), and by encouraging and facilitating other medical and construction mission trips to Guanaja, they set about trying to improve the quality of life for the residents and families of this Bay Island. Mission trips have been taking place before and since our trip in 2005. A mission trip has even been planned for this month, if the Honduran government's coup has been resolved.

While some may try to characterize this trip as a trip to a luxurious Caribbean island, it is important to remember that Honduras is one of the poorest countries in the world, and like Haiti and Cuba, it has not been the destination of choice for the typical tourist or visitor to the Caribbean. It is not Club Med or Sandals. It is closer to (and may be) a Third World country.

Upon returning from the trip to Honduras, Jean and I talked about what we could do to contribute to the ongoing mission work in Guanaja, and to help the hard working people we met in Guanaja. Before we left the island, we talked with a community leader we had met, Roger. He explained that among the many needs his community had, one of the greatest was the ability to fight the ravaging wildfires that plagued their islands. Because of the mountainous terrain, the absence of roads, and the inability to pump water onto the fires, they can only fight their fires by hand. Because of the intense heat and smoke, their firefighters

were only able to fight the fire for a few minutes before they had to retreat and recover. The loss of property, the number of serious injuries, and loss of lives had become overwhelming, and another source of chronic frustration and anxiety for these hard working people.

Jean and I decided that we should purchase self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) for the Honduran firefighters in an attempt to better equip them to fight their wildfires. We were personally able to purchase two SCBA units from a company in Fairhope, Alabama for about \$7000. I took them to Bill and asked him to present them to the firefighters in Guanaja the next time he traveled to Honduras. I have not been back to Honduras since May 2005, but I know they were appreciative of the equipment, and it has made fighting their fires (while still difficult and dangerous) much easier and more effective.

Four years later, and after talking to hundreds of people about our trip to Guanaja, it has come to my attention that I should have filed a Gift report with the Florida Ethics Commission. It doesn't matter that Bill and Martha have been my personal friends for at least 25 years, or that Jean has been their friend for around 40 years. It doesn't matter that Bill and Martha were committed to making the trip at that time (to deliver building materials and supplies whether I went or not). And it doesn't matter that there was extra space available on the plane that might have gone unused during this trip. In other words, it doesn't matter that this trip wasn't planned around me or my schedule.

It does matter that the trip and lodging on their island had value. And it does matter that the value of the transportation and lodging had a value greater than \$100. It does matter that I didn't file a Gift Report (Form 9) with the Florida Ethics Commission in the quarter after I returned from Honduras. I should have known better, and I am sorry. I also know there are supporters and constituents that will be disappointed and upset with me for this technical violation.

Please accept this letter and supporting documentation as an explanation for the late reporting of this gift. I have offered this explanation publicly at a meeting of the Santa Rosa County Commission on July 9, 2009. I hope this provides the information you need to determine the resolution of this technical violation of the Quarterly Gift Disclosure.
