Dear Dr. Kelly:

FIRE's Student Press Freedom Initiative<sup>1</sup> appreciates your response to our May 1 letter.<sup>2</sup> However, we remain concerned about Pensacola State College's viewpoint-based denial of funding for *Just Opposed*, a student-designed arts and culture magazine.<sup>3</sup>

As you clarified, the students in Dr. Marisa Mills's classes were able to complete their class assignment, and the college only restricted their ability to print the publication after the class ended.<sup>4</sup> As you note in your response, and assuming that the college takes no future negative action of any kind towards Dr. Mills, this means the college did not violate Dr. Mills' academic freedom rights. However, PSC's viewpoint-based denial of publication funding continues to violate the students' First Amendment rights.<sup>5</sup> Moreover, the students' accounts of this event make clear PSC had every intention of publishing the magazine until you discovered the

content.<sup>6</sup> It's reported that you even suggested students cut or edit stories that made "mention of LGBTQ" in order to allow the magazine to be printed.<sup>7</sup>

As you know, the decisions and actions of a public college—including about the funding of student publications—must comply with the First Amendment.<sup>8</sup> While the government is not obligated to subsidize student First Amendment activity like campus publications, it may not deny those subsidies based on the publications' viewpoints.<sup>9</sup>

PSC denied funding for *Just Opposed* because its administrators believed the publication's coverage of LGBTQ issues violated the Stop WOKE Act.<sup>10</sup> Despite the college's post-hoc claims to the contrary, PSC administrators' contemporaneous accounts of their rationale make clear that their decision to deny funding was based on the articles' viewpoints. Furthermore, the alleged Stop WOKE Act issue concerned the Act's prohibition on college funding of dangerous ideas,<sup>11</sup> the exact kind of funding denial the First Amendment bars.<sup>12</sup> PSC may not withhold funding from *Just Opposed*—particularly funding it was *already planning to provide*—based on the ideas students dared express in its pages.

The college's persistent censorship of *Just Opposed*—and its attempt to cover up its unconstitutional motive—is an illustration of its "reckless or callous indifference to the federally protected rights of others."<sup>13</sup> We remind you that a public college administrator who violates clearly established law, such as that barring the viewpoint-discriminatory denial of a subsidy,<sup>14</sup> will not retain qualified immunity and can be held personally responsible for monetary damages for violating First Amendment rights.<sup>15</sup>

Given the ongoing violation of the *Just Opposed* authors' and editors' rights, we request a substantive response to this letter no later than the close of business on May 18, 2026,

I had no interactions with Dr. Mills regarding this project until after it was completed, when I was informed about the articles the week before final exams on April 28, 2026.
